Annual Memorial Day Community Service at Lone Trees Cemetery: Scouts and parents are welcome to help. It is a great opportunity to honor our veterans and the scouts get a glimpse at some local history by reading the tombstone. This is the holiday weekend and I know many of our scout families are out of town. Please try to stop by before you leave or on your way home.

May 25: Memorial Day Flag Placement at Lone Trees Cemetery. On Friday, we will meet at 3:30 (come right after school) to place flags on the graves of our American Veterans. This should take about 1-1/2 to 2 hours. Class A uniform with Sash.

May 28: Memorial Day Flag Removal at Lone Trees Cemetery. On Monday, we'll meet at 4:30 to remove the flags. This should take about 1 hour.

Skills Weekend/Black Diamond Mines Hike-a-Thon – May 18 - 20 Scout in Charge: Mitch Avery and Jacob Schultz, Adult in Charge: Mr. Avery and Mr. Pica

The skills weekend overnight is from Friday May 18th to Sunday May 20th. Mitch is the scoutin-charge for the Skills weekend. It is for scouts that are not first class yet and also for older scouts who can sign off the younger scouts' books. We are meeting at the Masonic Center on May18th at 5:00 pm and leaving around 5:30 pm. We'll be returning on the 20th at the Masonic center around 1-2 pm. It will be at Black Diamond Mines near Antioch and the cost is \$23. Also in this outing will be the hike-a thon.

Jacob Schultz is the scout-in-charge for the actual **hike at Black Diamond Mines**. Scouts will be doing about 10.6 miles and there is a pull out point at about 6 miles for anyone that has had enough. The hike will take them past all most all of the historical sites that are a part of the Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve. Rose HIII Cemetery, Jim's Place", Air Shaft, and Stope, to name a few of the sights. Black Diamond in this case stands for Coal which was mined in the late 1860's. It was also used as a sand mine for the glass industry in the 1920's - '40's. The park has a really nice website with lots of information: www.ebparks.org/parks/black_diamond

This will be the first time our troop has gone out to this area. Scouts going should bring a flashlight as they will be going into Prospect Tunnel, they will also need <u>multiple</u> bottles of water as none is available in the park. Sunscreen will be called for and it can get quite windy out there. It is not usually too hot at that time of year but it can be. Class A for Travel and Class B for the hike and don't forget your hat and sunglasses. Hiking boots are called for, not just tennis shoes. (break them in ahead of time if they are new) Pack a lunch and your 10 essentials in your day bag and you should be ready for a great time.

Those that are not participating in the Skills Weekend can still do the Saturday hike. **Just meet up in the upper parking lot at 8:30 am, on Saturday, May 19.** Allow an hour+ travel time to get there from Castro Valley.

The Hike-a-thon sponsor forms and information packets has been distributed. If you have any questions about the fund raising part of this event, please contact Mr. Pica. If your scout account is running low on funds, this is the time to step up and hike. The Hike-a-thon is designed so that each scout can get out of it, what they put in. If you are work at it, you can pay for a whole year of scouting with just this one fundraiser.

Wente Scout Reservation, one of the most popular Boy Scout camps in Northern California, is located among the rolling hills and woodlands about 10miles east of the town of Willits near the headwaters of the Russian River. While the actual cost of this trip is \$418 the troop committee leadership has voted to subsidize \$100 per scout from the unit's general fund, therefore the charge is \$318 per Scout (plus special merit badge fees). The initial deposit of \$150 and signed parental permission slip is due. The remaining balance of \$168 and the doctor-approved BSA health form is due by March 14. Scout Master Minute

Scout in Charge / Adult in Charge System

The new 2012-13 Calendar is almost finished. Dates are set and there is Committee Approval. Soon we will be looking to fill in the youth and adult leadership for each event. With the size of our Troop now, each scout will likely get to lead only one event per year unless they are in a Youth Leadership position which requires them to lead more.

Being in charge of an event is a privilege for both youth and adults. It is also perhaps the single best platform in scouting to develop leadership and organization which culminates in the Eagle Project and complements the Youth Leadership structure.

But what does it mean though to be "in-charge?"

Not every event is equal in its requirements. Some events are day events and set in time and place in advance and do not require collecting and accounting money and simply require the scout in charge to promote and lead the event such as Scouting for Food or Earth Day Clean Up. Others require months of planning, reservations for both the campsite and the activity, determining how much it will cost, collecting the money, generating drivers, choosing a pick up time and location and a drop off, and making sure we are following the Guide to Safe Scouting. Examples of such are the recent Whitewater Rafting trip and the upcoming Big Adventure and the Mt. Wittenberg Rim Rover / Kayaking outing coming up next year.

Scouts are not born knowing how to lead an outing nor do they have all the skills to arrange guides or negotiate better rates or to ask the extra questions to overcome obstacles in the event. It is the adults' job to coach the scouts. This is the scouts' time to learn and the adults' time to teach. The adult should not be doing the work for the scout as the scout should not be robbed of his opportunity to learn. The adult should benefit too by working with a youth other than his own son to see what his son will be capable of in a few years or to see how far his son has come from just a few short years ago.

Remember also to allow enough time for the scouts to plan the event and prod them as necessary. Even if it takes the scouts 2 to 6 times longer than it would take an adult, it is part of the process.

In the near future it is a goal to set up an internal Troop 726 Adult in Charge training program. We have many adults who are transitioning out and many great new adults. Much of what we have done recently has been by tradition and formalizing the process will help everyone. We will base the training on BSA resources and our own experiences to keep the good program going. In the meantime, please review the calendar when it is issued and volunteer to be either the first or second adult in charge for an outing or to simply be an adult driver / chaperone. We'll see you at the events.






