We hope you had a nice summer and the Scouts had the time of their lives enjoying the fun offered by a Scout camp. I had the opportunity to do three camp assessments. I got to visit camps in Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. They all may be a little different but one common denominator is they each deliver the promise of fun and adventure. At summer Scout camp merit badges were earned or a Scout received partials. As a reminder to all, the blue cards may have been given to the adult leadership. If a badge was completed, please to not wait to record in the system. Make sure the Scout has his part of the blue card. If they received a partial, the Scout should have the blue card and hopefully will take the opportunity to complete. The blue cards are the property of the Scout.

Recently we provided to the adult leadership an update to Scout handbook requirements. Beginning 8/1/202 minor modifications to the Scouts BSA requirements for the Scout through Star take effect. Scouts may continue using the existing requirements for the rank on which they are currently working or they may choose to use the new requirements. Scouts must use the new requirements once they advance to their next rank. On 1/1/2023, all Scouts must use only the new requirements. We will have copies of the "minor" requirement changes at the September 7th round-table.

At Eagle Scout boards of review, we are seeing more Scouts that have as a position of responsibility – Troop Guide. However, so many candidates have a problem de-







scribing what were or are their responsibilities as a Troop Guide. Most state that they were not provided training or even a description of what they were/are to do in the position. Troop guide is another of the positions of responsibility that enhances a Scout's leadership skill set and helps the Scout qualify for their rank advancement. Equally important, and perhaps even more so, a troop guide plays a key role in the retention and advancement for other Scouts in their units. The troop guide should be an older Scout who holds at least the First Class rank and who can work well with younger Scouts. The Scouts BSA Handbook says it best: the troop guide should be an experienced Scout who "introduces new Scouts to troop operations and guides them through early Scouting activities. The troop guide serves as a coach to the patrol leader of the new-Scout patrol, and they work together at patrol leaders' council meetings. The troop guide helps new Scouts earn the First Class rank within their first 12 to 18 months." In fact, some could even argue that because of this role, the troop guide might be one of the most important positions of responsibility within a troop. Considering the importance of this position of responsibility, the senior patrol leader and Scoutmaster should give a great deal of thought when appointing troop guides. More importantly, they should provide every guide with initial and ongoing training and guidance for the duration of their tenures.

Powahay is still looking for a few good adults to be merit badge counselors for the new merit badge – Citizenship in Society. Speaking to a few current counselors, they have all stated they enjoy working with the Scouts on this badge.



Help Wanted Robotic Expert... Or anyone looking for a technical challenge!

The BSA NOVA STEM Program Why is STEM important to Scouting?

Youth enjoy learning about the world. Their curiosity drives them to learn how and why things work. They are natural born Scientists when they observe natural phenomena around them or experiment with things they see. When they try and figure out physical relationships or answer problems, they are exercising/developing Mathematical skills. When they start programming our smart phones and writing apps, they are developing Technology skills. Then when they put it all together and build a replica power plant using Legos or try and make a rocket or fort, they are using Engineering skills.

What is STEM? Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. STEM loosely applies to anything relating to studying the STEM fields or interest in the STEM fields. In BSA, the STEM program is a formal part of the overall BSA program and is integrated into the activities at all levels. The STEM awards (NOVAs and SUPERNOVAs) are recognitions for Scouts who show added interest in these fields.

Why is STEM important to Scouting? STEM studies have always been a part of Scouting. The principles behind STEM directly relate to the Aims of Scouting: Character Development (becoming self-sufficient and capable), Citizenship (understanding the world around us and how it works), Mental and Physical Fitness (developing critical thinking and reasoning skills).

Who are BSA STEM awards open to? The STEM program is open to any and all Scouts in BSA. The awards can only be earned by registered Scouts. However, including parents and siblings can make the activities more fun and inclusive.

How is STEM integrated with the Scouting programs? Each level of Scouting has its own NOVA and SUPERNOVA awards with requirements that are age appropriate. NOVA awards require completion of certain STEM related Cub Scout/Webelos adventures and Scouts BSA merit badges/activities

What types of things do the Scouts do? Conduct experiments, design and/or build simple to complex machines, coding, make and decipher secret messages, investigate orbital mechanics/stars/planets, build rockets, boats and cars, study the environment and nature/animals/plants, make volcanoes, study weather and geology, collect rocks/fossils, design and build a marble roller coaster, learn about farming and the science of agriculture, science of sports, learn about STEM professions and famous people in STEM areas.







Should STEM be a Scout led activity? For Scouts BSA there is a component of being Scout led. Each of the SU-PERNOVAS requires running a STEM activity for other Scouts to participate in. This is very important because the Cub Scouts SUPERNOVA requires participation in a Scouts BSA activities if possible. Scouts BSA will have the opportunity to have a Scout led activity at a District even such as the 2023 Spring STEM Camporee.

Why should parents participate? Scouting can only be successful with strong parent participation. The STEM potion of the program is even more so. This applies to all levels of the program. Thus, for Scouts to be successful, parents have to lend them a helping hand. From a purely rewarding point of view, there are few things a parent can do that is more rewarding than helping a child figure something out. The "aha" moment is really cool to see.

How can I get involved? All it takes to get involved is a desire to help. Being a counselor or mentor has no fixed duties other than to meet with and encourage Scouts in STEM activities. All it takes is a simple application and completion of Youth Protection training. However, there is a district level committee open to volunteers wanting to help out at a higher level.

Editorial

"We're a youth led troop and the youth leadership has decided not to attend the camporee."

This is where our "coaching" skills come into play.

As Troop Leaders we can recognize the value of camporees.

A camporee is a fun weekend filled with Scouts BSA skill competitions and meeting other Scouts from around our district. Camporee events are friendly and intended to motivate Scouts to master basic skills, engage in respectful competition, and further develop youth leadership and teamwork. A highlight of the weekend is the closing campfire, where top scoring patrols will receive awards, and everyone has the chance to enjoy Scout Spirit and friendship.

However, these values may not be apparent to Scouts in our Troops. A reason we hear for not attending camporee... "We're a youth led troop and the youth leadership has decided not to attend the camporee."

Yes -- We want them to make that decision. The Scouts BSA program is uniquely positioned to expose youth for the first time in their lives to make a program – plan it and execute it. From troop meetings, monthly campouts, long-term summer camps, district activities, and service projects, our youth should lead these and many more.

As Troop Leaders it is our job to coach and counselor our youth leaders to make the best choices.

This is where our "coaching" skills come into play. Ask some key questions. Do you have youth leaders such as Patrol Leaders that would benefit in meeting leadership requirements for their next rank? Do you have younger Scouts that would benefit from the camporee or have never been to a camporee? Are they looking at the needs of Scouts in the troop in making that decision? Remind SPL's and other senior leaders that organizing your troop for a camporee could firm up their leadership for their next rank and Eagle.

We often hear... "All we do is tie knots, fire building, compass, etc." That's not entirely true. Yes, we want to build in Scout skills to put into practice basic skills but we also include leadership challenges, and just for fun stations as well. Encourage your older Scouts to help with running a station or help with other program needs if they are looking for different challenges. Ask for ideas on stations or activities that your SPL can present to the hosting troop.

Troop 35 Darien is planning an exciting Mission Possible Fall Camporee October 14-16 at Hoyt. We hope to see you there.

All "Drop-in Hikes" are self-directed hikes. Packs and Troops participating need to ensure that a sufficient number of trained Adult Leaders are there to lead and supervise your group.



BSA SAFETY MOMENT SCOUTERS CODE OF CONDUCT

Please know that the Boy Scouts of America expects Scouters to follow the Scout Oath and Scout Law as well as other laws and regulations. The Scouter Code of Conduct should be reviewed regularly; abiding by it is acknowledged by all adults when they complete an application. This code of conduct:

- Provides a checklist of expectations for all adults involved in Scouting.
- Emphasizes the need for all adults to follow the BSA's Youth Protection policies and guidelines.
- Highlights the need for adult leaders to be familiar with the Guide to Safe Scouting and SAFE.
- States that drivers will obey all laws and follow safe driving practices when transporting Scouts.
- Sets expectations regarding the BSA Rules and Regulations, policies, and BSAprovided training.
- Helps adults to model behaviors for all youth involved in BSA activities.
- Emphasizes a leader's responsibility to notify the appropriate person(s) if a violation occurs.

SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT
